The phone rang and I answered it as usual. The person on the other end was Natalino Giovanni. So, who is Natalino and why is he newsworthy? Well, he has been a recipient of our materials for the last eight years while living in Eritrea, a former province of Ethiopia. In September of last year, he emailed to tell us to stop our mailing because of censorship. That was the last we heard of him until this phone call earlier this month.

After the introduction and greetings, Natalino proceeded to tell me that he was calling from Atlanta, GA. I was pleasantly surprised and excited for him. I praised God that he was able to make it out of the country safely. Natalino went on to tell me that he had been accused by the Eritrean government of distributing EOM's materials and was imprisoned for five months. After his release, he escaped to Sudan, a neighboring country but, afraid that he would be returned to Eritrea if he stayed too long and waited to go through a resettlement program he opted to come to the States via a student visa. He is now seeking asylum in the US. Look for his testimony in our next issue. ~ Sossena Maybury

I cannot call him anymore whenever I need help. Since he is sitting with the saints in heaven, I won't be sitting with him in church every Sunday anymore either.
